**EFMLS:** The board discussed the possibility of hosting a future EFMLS Annual Meeting. It would be held concurrently with our annual show (the third weekend in March, perhaps in 2016 or 2017) and would feature some additional banquets, talks, judged exhibits, and possible field trips. GLMSMC volunteers would be needed to support the planning and execution of the EFLMS activities, though some of the planning and hosting would be covered by EFLMS committees. The Board agreed to further consider the pros and cons at future meetings.

**Silent Auction:** Some lapidary and jewelry equipment and supplies previously donated to the Society will be auctioned at the October meeting.

**Show:** Major costs for the March 21-22, 2015 show were discussed, as well as some publicity considerations. Holly volunteered to lead the efforts sign up volunteers for various jobs at the show.

**Treasurer:** The treasurer's report had been presented by email and generated no discussion. The board discussed the (on-going) audit of the Society's financial records. It was M/S/P to recommend a change to the by-laws to require only one individual perform the auditing function (as opposed to two, as currently required). The Society membership will vote on this recommended change at a future Society meeting.

**Sundry:** A field trip is being planned for collecting fossils at Brownie's Beach on the Chesapeake Bay. The board discussed possible modifications to the raffling of a Junior Door Prize at meetings. The board also discussed the possibility of adding non-commercial, member-to-member classified ads to the Rockhounder; some guidelines will be drafted and discussed at a future meeting.

The September 8th, 2014, meeting was called to order by President Chris Luzier at 7:45 pm, with approximately 50 (40 adults + 7 youth + 3 children) people attending. Members were active in renewing their membership and in looking over the collections of show & tell specimens that were brought in. Board members were reminded that this month's BOD meeting would be held on Monday, 15<sup>th</sup>. We have solid dates of March 21 & 22, 2015 for our Annual Show at the Gaithersburg Fairgrounds. Support from all GLMS-MC members is essential for the success of this show. The August 2014 meeting will feature a silent auction. GLMS-MC member Gerald Muirkirk who is working on a new public exhibit is looking for assistance in sawing and polishing a 12" section of petrified wood. Members were informed that the Franklin-Sterling Hill (New Jersey) Gem & Mineral Show & Outdoor Swap & Sell event will be held this month on Saturday & Sunday, September 27 & 28, at the Franklin School & the Sterling Hill Mine Museum, 7:30AM to 6:00PM. The last Sunday of the month (Sept. 28<sup>th</sup>) marks the only day in the month when daytime collecting is allowed in the Passaic Pit and "saddle" areas of the Sterling Zinc Mines (Mindat lists 243 mineral species & 23 Type Localities!!). It was M/S/A to approve the minutes of the August, 2014 regular and BOD meetings.

**Awards:** Mark Dahlman announced achievement awards (Maps) and badges (Stone Age Tools & Arts) by youth members. Congratulations go to Trevor, Cooper, Jonathan, Cassy, Ryan, Peter, & Jennifer for their accomplishments.

**Editor of the Rockhounder:** The EFMS awarded former editor, Kristin Lomaugh, with its annual trophy for "Distinguished New Editor". The GLMS urgently needs to have a member step up to this position. Jonathan Harris, GLMS Field Trip Chairman has been generously giving his time to keep the Rockhounder going and has made some important changes to simplify and streamline the job of editor.

**Field Trips:** Jonathan Harris reminded members that GLMS-MC was invited to participate with the NOVA club in a field trip on Saturday, September 13<sup>th</sup> to the Vulcan Quarry in Manassas, VA. Members must meet at the quarry office at 7AM and collect until noon. A field trip to the Kyanite Mine at Willis Mountain, VA is arranged for September 27<sup>th</sup> from 8:30 AM to 1 PM. Thanks to some sleuthing and assistance from EFMS members in Delaware, Jonathan has arranged a field trip to the Cornwall Mine Dump, Cornwall, PA for October 11<sup>th</sup> from XX AM to YY PM. Details and directions have been sent out by email to all members. Members must RSVP with Jonathan and come properly equipped with personal protective equipment.

**Eastern Federation (EFMLS):** Wendell Mohr brought to GLMS-MC members attention a new exhibit at the National Geographic Society Building in Washington, DC: "Spinosaurus, the lost dinosaur of the Cretaceous" with speakers on October 16<sup>th</sup>. Space is limited!!!

**Treasurer's Report (Holly McNeil):** The only financial activity reported since June was membership dues and one minor expense. Our operating reserves, net of the Lillian Turner designated funds, is \$30,831.55. GLMS-MC member Tom Parnell has been working on an auditing of the books for 2013. Year to date we are at a positive operating budget of \$5,975.98.

**Visitors:** Peter Alexander (Rockville, MD) and Ben Dodge, (Rockville, MD), a recent graduate of Penn State Univ. were welcomed and it was M/S/P that they be accepted as new members.

**Vice President (Dave Tiktinsky):** Announced that any and all GLMS-MC members are welcomed to serve as speakers at our monthly meetings. Key elements of the presentation should be: 1) Interesting to all levels of attendance, 2) Enlightening-informative, 3) Non-scientific and non-technical, 4) Have a theme and follow it, and 5) Make it Visual.

**Presentation:** VP Dave Tiktinsky introduced Dr. Wayne Sukow, a graduate of Michigan Tech, a member of the National Science Foundation, previous assistant director of Wildacres, and president of the Eastern Federation of Mineralogical Societies. His presentation, which received the highest award given by the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies (AFMS) in 2011 was entitled: "Red Gold and Polished Agates: Upper Michigan's Hidden Treasures".

Many, if not all members of the GLMS-MC share a special interest in agates, and archeological research has found evidence that we humans have had a fascination with agates for thousands of years. Wayne Sukow introduced us to the geological fact, and beauty of copper agates, that he has been collecting and studying for many years. The upper Penninsula of Michigan had once been the site of a major copper boom in the U.S., with hundreds of mines and millions of tons of rock processed for copper.

One of those mines, the Wolverine No. 2 has been the source of the enigmatic copper agate. Enigmatic, because few of these copper agates were collected, and the once rich mine dump that yielded them has vanished....all its rock has been reprocessed and turned into the raised bedding beneath asphalt roadways.

Thanks to Dr. Wayne Sukow, the secrets of these agates has been coming to light and we understand that the unique colors and patterns derive from such minerals as cuprite-chalotrichite (red), tennorite (black), green (malachite, epidote, & chlorite), silver (blue), quartz-chalcedony (white), Calcite-iceland spar (clear), and bornite (iridescence).

**Prizes:** The Show Table winner of a rare, polished copper-silver-datolite agate, donated by Dr. Wayne Sukow, was John McKee. The general Door Prize of a small cabinet size specimen of smokey quartz on orthoclase feldspar from Moat Mtn., New Hampshire, was Diane Leaman.

**Mystery of Sailing Stones of Death Valley Solved** is by Scripps Institute of Oceanography <https://scripps.ucsd.edu/news/mystery-solved-sailing-stones-death-valley-seen-action-first-time>, part of the University of California at San Diego. Race Track Playa in the northern part of Death Valley has 100's of rocks up to 700 pounds leaving trails spanning 100's of yards. Using interesting scientific methods paleobiologist Richard Norris reports on first-hand observations of the phenomenon solving an age old geological question of how they happen.

**Botswana's Scintillating Moment** at <http://www.gia.edu/gems-gemology/summer-2014-weldon-botswana-scintillating-moment> is authored by Robert Weldon and Russell Shor of the GIA. They trace the development of diamond resources, a joint venture of DeBeers and Botswana. It has the capacity to make ready for market almost 45 million carats of rough per year, or about 40% of the world's total annual diamond supply. In an extensive report they cover the social and economic impact, not only of diamonds, but

**Saturday October 11, 2014** 9am- Cornwall Dumps, Lebanon, PA Collect at the dumps of the historic Cornwall iron mine. The series of mines operated from 1732 to 1973. See <http://www.mindat.org/loc-3653.html> for information about the mine and minerals found. These dumps have been noted sources of micro-mounts.

Also, if you have the time nearby, The Cornwall Iron Furnace has a museum with some of the historic buildings and a furnace restored and offers tours. Our family visited this site about 12 years ago. I will not have time to stay as I need to be back in Rockville by 3:30pm.

Please RSVP to me by October 9.

Meet at 9am at the Iron Valley Golf Club. Park in the lot. We can walk together. If you are late the directions are below. There are no age restrictions; children must be with a parent and parents should be aware that the site may have hazards, such as opportunities to fall or drown (i.e. there is a lake---a flooded mine).

This is not an active mine; however it is still private property. Please note our waiver and rules still apply, but you won't need the hard hats or steel toed boots; however sturdy shoes/boots are highly recommended unless you enjoy physical therapy and paying a lot of doctor bills. You will need gloves, long pants, and eye protection.

Location of meeting place: Cornwall Mine Dumps, Iron Valley Golf Club, 201 Iron Valley Dr, Lebanon, PA 17042. For directions please consult the email or use mapping software.

Travel Time from Rockville 2hrs 15minutes.

Walking from parking lot:

Walk behind the clubhouse. You'll pass about a bazillion golf carts on your right.

Walk west on the golf cart path. The path is immediately behind the clubhouse.

Almost as soon as you pass the clubhouse, the path splits. Take the right-hand path.

This path takes you up to, and across, Iron Valley Dr.

The path forks in a little bit...stay left

The path loops to the right, and then back to the left.....stay on it

In a very short while you'll be at the top of the tailings pile. If you don't see it, it's because a bit of a berm on your left is obscuring it.

**Sunday October 26, 2014** 10:30-am-1PM, Bay Front Park (aka Brownies Beach) Chesapeake Beach, MD, along northern end of Calvert Cliffs.

Mark Dahlman will be leading a fossil collecting fieldtrip to Bay Front Park (Brownie's Beach). Meet at the parking lot @10:30am on October 26. Low tide should be at about 11:45 AM. Brownies Beach is just South of Chesapeake Beach along the famous Calvert Cliffs. Children are welcome and must be accompanied by a parent.

By attending you agree to our waiver of liability below. Please RSVP to myself and Mark Dahlman (mddahlman@yahoo.com ) by replying to this message or making sure the words in the subject heading of this message are in your message.

Also be aware of the following safety rules and issues:

- 1) Absolutely no digging into the cliffs. This is illegal.
- 2) The cliffs have unstable parts that could drop trees or large chunks of clay and rock on people. People have been killed in some of these accidents. There should be plenty of places to go that are not right under the cliffs. We will not restrict you--if you or your family go under the cliffs it is at your risk.
- 3) When the tide causes the water level to rise, it will reach the cliff base in spots. Don't get trapped.

Directions to Bay Front Park (Brownie's Beach)

Take the Beltway exit 11A onto Rt 4 South (Pennsylvania Avenue) towards Upper Marlboro.

From Rt. 4:

Take a right at the traffic light (Rt. 261/Bayside Road) as you enter Town and continue south.

Pass through the next light (Mears Road) and travel one mile. On the right is Beach Elementary School for auxiliary parking for busy weekends and holidays.

Regular Parking: if you were to continue south on Rt. 261, Bay Front parking lot is ¼ mi. on the left hand side.

If there is sufficient interest, then it is likely we can all go to the nearby Middleburg Quarry. This is a great site for wavelite, strontianite, fluorite (purple masses) and more recently varascite and turquoise. Collectors should bring a specimen from some other location for Eric Stahl, the manager of National Limestone Quarry. If the operator blasts in certain sections, celestite and sphalerite might also be found.

The trip will start at 9am at the quarry office. Mt. Pleasant Mills is about 3-3.5 hours away, but it is worth it! Children are permitted 10 and older, but a parent must stay near and supervise their children and leave the quarry with them if they get too restless to be safe.

Please RSVP by October 29. Quarries are now often requesting that we have a minimum number of people so that their employees' time will be used effectively. Thus it is important that people who sign up on these and other trips attend.

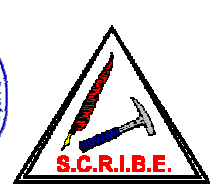
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
