
President's Message

GLMSMC Regular Meeting Minutes from June 14th, 2021

The June 14th, 2021 meeting was called to order by President Holly Heighes at 7:45 PM. There were approximately 37 people in attendance. The meeting was conducted online. A motion passed to approve the minutes of the May 10th, 2021 regular meeting.

President: Holly Heighes welcomed visitors to the meeting, including Nancy Muir, mother of Andy Muir, and others. Holly thanked Jonathan for covering the last meeting.

It was M/S/P to approve the change to the club by-laws, published in the preceding Rockhounder, regarding the makeup of the BOD. It was also M/S/P to approve the change to the club by-laws, published in the preceding Rockhounder, regarding the replacement of the terminology audit.

Holly announced that the Rockville Senior Center will be reopening in July. The September meeting is expected to be in-person, although that is subject to change. She reminded members of the club members-only picnic the day prior to the meeting. The Board of Directors meeting was announced. Any member is welcome to attend.

Treasurer: Jonathan Harris delivered a Treasurer's report. Income included membership. Expenses included storage fees for Wendell's collection.

Membership: Doug Baum supplied contact information for potential new members. Chris Luzier discussed upcoming events in Franklin, NJ. The Franklin Mineral Museum will sponsor special digs of Mill Site material each month over the summer. A pond swap and sale will occur on July 31st.

Program: Holly introduced our speaker for the evening, Jim Van Fleet. The talk was entitled "Historic Franklin and Sterling Mines of Northern New Jersey." Jim started by discussing the location, extent, and unique of the two ore bodies in Franklin and Ogdensburg. The 366 minerals discovered so far represent 6.5% of those in the world. Of those, 71 were first described there, 17 occur only there and, most importantly, over 90 have some fluorescent response. Beginning with the many daylight colors and different textures of willemite, Jim led a visual tour of these fluorescent, and a few non-fluorescent, species, including additional interesting details for collectors along the way. He went generally from common to rarities, such as znucalite and roeblingite. Then he discussed other collecting opportunities from specimens that show geological features to possibilities with new LW flashlights to mining artifacts. After Vice President Ken Reynolds gave a brief background on the speaker, Jim answered questions from an appreciative

audience. Thanks, Jim.

Ken discussed upcoming presentations on Herkimer diamonds, Mt. Pleasant Mills wavellite, and rare earth minerals from the Rutherford No. 2 Mine.

Field Trips: An upcoming limited access trip to the Middleburg and Mt. Pleasant Mills quarries was announced for June 25th. Details to be provided by email.

Show Table: In honor of our presentation and the local availability, a suggestion for the show table was to bring your Franklin district specimens. Those with items to present were asked to provide the information in the chat to facilitate inclusion in the minutes.

- Karen Lottes showed a glass jar of opals self-collected from her father's office.
- Jeff Cessna showed:
 - -Sphalerite (var cleiophane), willemite, from Sterling Hill, Ogdensburg, NJ
 - -Hardystonite (xtal), bustamite, clinohedrite, willemite, from the Mill Site, Franklin, NJ
 - -Margarosanite from Franklin, NJ
 - -Sphalerite, unknown (LW blue), franklinite, zincite from Franklin Mining District, NJ. Chris Luzier gave a potential ID for the unknown as calcite from Sterling Hill.
- Ken Reynolds showed a clinohedrite, hardystonite, and bustamite specimen from Franklin.
- Chris Luzier showed a well-crystalized andradite garnet with pale green willemite, barite, and franklinite.
- Jonathan Harris showed:
 - -A phosphorescent willemite vein in calcite, self-collected at Sterling Hill, NJ
 - -A green willemite with daylight fluorescence from Franklin, NJ
 - -A reddish-brown willemite crystal self-collected Sterling Hill mine dump from special material.
- Pat Repik-Byrne showed two cut geodes showing unknown fluorescent minerals.
- Joel Rosen showed his U-Haul T-shirt with the theme of New Jersey state, highlighting fluorescent minerals from Franklin.

Adjournment: It was M/S/P to adjourn the meeting at 9:38 PM.









Meetings: The July and August meeting will be programs only with no associated business meetings. A Board of Directors meeting will be needed in August to finalize picnic planning.

Treasurer: A Treasurer's report was received prior to the meeting. There were no additional details to report.



Summer is a good time to add to your fossil collection. One of the activities to earn our next badge, Fossils, is to curate a fossil collection. When it comes to our collections there is nothing more important than good curation so these instructions for the badge activity are worth repeating:

Build a fossil collection of 10 to 20 specimens. Some collectors concentrate on a single sort of plant or animal (for instance, trilobites) and try to collect a wide range of species. Others concentrate on one locality or formation and build an array of all the plants and animals that locality has to offer. Still others opt for diversity, trying to collect a little bit of everything (clams, brachiopods, corals, shark teeth, trilobites, etc.). Whichever form you choose, be sure to follow the basics of good curation, labeling each specimen and keeping a log book with key information (what it is, where it came from, age of the fossil, etc.).

Between now and when we meet again, keep your eyes out for fossils to build your collection whether that is something you can find, or something you buy (there are a lot of inexpensive fossils available these days). Perhaps you have some fossils already that could use a label, or just a little organizing.

I'd love to see pictures of your collection, as well as any interesting fossil-related web links to share with the group! My email address is shown below.

Diamonds

"Diamonds are a girl's best friend," according to DeBeers, anyway. They have been known for thousands of years for their sparkle and durability. They are the hardest natural substance known, 10 on the Mohs Scale.

Diamonds are formed usually at depths of about ten miles or more, deep in the earth's mantle where the pressure is about 50K atmospheres and the temperature is around 1000oC. They erupt toward the surface in rocks, called kimberlites or lamproites. Pipes of these rocks are found around the world, but those containing diamonds are widely scattered. Diamonds also may be formed when large meteors strike the earth.

The color of a diamond may be caused by a trace impurity or a defect in the crystal lattice. The lattice is particularly stable, so impurities are mostly excluded and most gem diamonds are colorless Boron is responsible for the color of blue diamonds, while nitrogen produces yellow to brown colors. In these cases, either the boron or the nitrogen replace a few carbon atoms in the crystal. Green diamonds result from natural radiation of the crystal that disrupts the lattice. It is thought that plastic deformation may be the source of pinks and reds.

The most productive pipes being mined today are in Russia, Botswana, Australia, and the Democratic Republic of the Congo. The richest pipe is the Argyle Mine in Australia where production peaked in the 1990s at 42 metric tons per year. Major discoveries have been made also in Canada, Brazil, Zimbabwe, and Angola. In the U.S., the only producing pipe seems to be Crater of Diamonds in Arkansas. Individual alluvial diamonds have been found in Northern states, mostly Midwestern, but these are thought to be glacial material from Canada.


