Title of Talk: "Musings of a Mineral Museum Curator"

I am honored to announce Dr. Jeffrey E. Post as the distinguished speaker for the March 13th, 2023 meeting. Dr. Post will discuss highlights at the Smithsonian, along with a review of his experience at the Tucson Gem & Mineral Show this past February, and other news of the Museum. As a boy, Jeff became interested in minerals and geology at a very early age and continually brought home rocks in his pockets. He was just really fascinated by them. He recalled seeing a beautiful quartz crystal in fourth grade that amplified his interest in minerals and science, and he also owned an awesome chemistry set that made science great fun. professors, and a passion for minerals, and it seems inevitable that he ended up with a career in science. He shared that he is fortunate that what he does for a job is also his hobby.

Dr. Post is a native of Wisconsin and received his Bachelor of Science degrees in geology and chemistry from the University of Wisconsin-Platteville, and his PhD. degree, with a specialty in geochemistry, from Arizona State University. He was a Postdoctoral Research Fellow for three years in the Department of Geological Sciences at Harvard University prior to joining the Department of Mineral Sciences at the Smithsonian Institution in 1984. Since 1991, he has served as Mineralogist and is Curator-In-Charge of Gems and Minerals of the U.S. National Gem and Mineral Collection at the Smithsonian Institution. His research interests include environmental mineralogy, single crystal and X-ray diffraction, manganese oxide minerals, clay minerals, computer modeling of mineral structures, and gemology. He has published more than 100 scientific articles in these fields.

This rescheduled Board meeting was called to order on February 6 at 7:30 PM. This was rescheduled for earlier in the month as Jonathan would be out of town for the regularly scheduled Board meeting date.

Most of the meeting was devoted to the rock auction the following week and the upcoming rock show at the Gaithersburg Fairgrounds on March 18 and 19.

We are waiting on the invoice/hours breakdown for the security company so they can be paid. The ATM machine, the tables, and chair rentals have all been taken care of and paid for the rock show, along with the Fairgrounds rental as well. All of the dealer tables have been booked and paid for by the dealers.

Treasurer Diane said that the Federal taxes have been filed and MD were being completed. She said that the last auction did very well and the club is doing well.

Property manager Joel said that there was shop equipment in the back of the trailer, which will be reviewed and disposed of when the trailer is unloaded. Bonfire, anyone?

The last meeting, a discussion was had and a motion was made to dispose of the lapidary shop machines. Two would be kept for the cabbing demonstrations. Several suggestions were made, including auctioning them off or selling them at the rock show. They are all in good shape and had maintenance before they were stored. The sale will allow them to be removed from the property inventory—and free up space! They are to be made available to the members first on Friday set-up at the show and if any are left over, they will be offered to the public when the show closes on Sunday, around 4 PM. If a member is not able to be at the sale, they must find their own proxy to bid.






